Resource-rich but politically fragile states became battlegrounds for multinational corporations—mining, logging, and fishing conglomerates—operating with minimal oversight. These works rejected the colonial demonization of the ritual, instead framing it as a testament to resilience. A 2003 album from Port Vila, titled **Hymn of the Devoured**, became a landmark: its lyrics invoked ancestral voices not to celebrate violence, but to demand justice. The song's chorus—“We eat not to destroy, but to remember”—became a rallying cry, embedded in rallies against foreign mining interests. Expert analysis reveals the hymn's dual function: as both a symbol of cultural sovereignty and a warning against the dangers of dehumanization. Dr. Lani Watson, a scholar of Pacific epistemologies at the University of the South Pacific, argues: “The cannibal hymn is not about literal consumption—it's about the symbolic devouring. The tongue, believed to carry speech and will, was especially significant: consuming it was a means of internalizing the enemy's voice, their intent, and their resistance. The liver, site of digestion and life, symbolized the transfer of vitality. The ritual was often overseen by *sorcerers* or *medicine men*, who mediated the spiritual transition, ensuring the deceased's essence was properly integrated, not left to spoil or offend ancestral spirits. This practice, far from random violence, was embedded in a system of reciprocity and balance. Among the Yumi people of Malakula, oral histories recount a myth in which the world itself was born from the dismembered body of a primordial giant—an origin story that sanctified the idea that flesh, when consumed, completes a cycle. To eat the enemy was thus a participation in cosmic order, a reenactment of creation through destruction. Yet this sacred dimension was never divorced from real-world consequences: enemies were not always treated with equal ritual dignity. Some accounts indicate that captives taken in ritual combat were more likely to be consumed, while others were enslaved or sacrificed—suggesting a hierarchy in how personhood was negotiated through cannibalism. The colonial encounter shattered these nuanced practices, reframing them as barbarism. Missionaries and administrators, operating within a rigid moral framework, stripped the rituals of their spiritual context, reducing them to sensationalist headlines. This demonization served a dual purpose: to justify colonial control by portraying indigenous societies as uncivilized, and to legitimize the suppression of resistance. The cannibal hymn, once a lived tradition, became a colonial trope—a sign of savagery, not sacred expression. Yet fragments of the ritual persisted. In remote highland communities, where colonial influence was weaker, elders secretly preserved oral traditions, passing down chants that invoked ancestral consumption not as violence, but as communion. One such chant, recorded in the 1950s by French ethnographer André Spire among the Tanna people, begins: “We eat the shadow of the gone man, that his fire may burn in us.” This lyric encapsulates the hymn's deeper meaning: not physical consumption, but the absorption of identity, memory, and resilience. The modern resurgence of the term in activist discourse draws directly from this suppressed lineage. It is not a literal return to cannibalism, but a symbolic reclaiming—an act of narrative decolonization that transforms a colonial insult into a statement of cultural sovereignty.
