The musical's budget, modest by Broadway standards, was reinvested not in spectacle, but in authenticity: the cast included Black and Brown performers in leading roles, reflecting the very integration the story championed. This decision was economically risky—few producers risked featuring non-white leads in a post-Grease** Broadway—but it paid dividends. **Hairspray** became a surprise hit, proving that authenticity could drive box office success. The script's evolution—from film to stage to global phenomenon—reveals a profound adaptability. The 2007 Broadway revival, directed by Jack O'Brien, reimagined the story for a post-9/11 America, deepening its themes of unity amid division. The 2007 film adaptation,**

starring John Travolta and Christopher Walken, introduced the story to a global audience, yet risked diluting its radical edge through Hollywood polish. Yet the musical's core remained resilient. Its lyrics, co-written by Waters and Mark Saltzman, retained the original's biting wit and emotional honesty. In scenes where Tracy Turnblad (later reimagined as a Black teen in some regional productions) confronts Mr. Pink, the tension is not merely personal—it is ideological. The question "Do you want to be beautiful?" is reframed as "Do you want to belong?" A deceptively simple inquiry that cuts to the heart of systemic exclusion. Controversy has always shadowed *Hairspray*. Waters' unapologetic embrace of queerness, racial mixture, and bodily autonomy challenged 1980s norms. The musical's depiction of interracial dating—though coded and

subtle in the film—was radical for its time, resisting the era’s racial purism. Critics accused it of “promoting disorder,” yet its greatest risk lay in its celebration of joy. In a decade defined by fear—of HIV, terrorism, and moral decay—*Hairspray* offered a counter-narrative: that laughter, dance, and collective celebration could be revolutionary. The industry’s hesitation mirrored broader societal anxieties; few producers wanted to back a show that centered marginalized voices as heroes.
