Grundlagen der deutschen Grammatik

Substantive (Nomen)

Substantive sind Wörter, die Dinge, Personen oder abstrakte Begriffe bezeichnen. Sie haben Geschlecht (Genus), Numerus (Singular oder Plural) und Fall (Kasus). Beispiele: - der Tisch (maskulin, Nominativ Singular) - die Lampe (feminin) - das Buch (neutral) Der bestimmte Artikel passt sich an das Geschlecht, den Fall und die Zahl des Substantivs an: - der (maskulin) - die (feminin/plural) - das (neutral)

Verben

Verben sind Tätigkeitswörter, die eine Handlung, einen Zustand oder Vorgang beschreiben. Sie verändern sich je nach Zeit, Person und Numerus. Beispiel: - ich lerne - du lernst - er lernt Verben werden konjugiert, um die Person und die Zeit anzuzeigen.

Adjektive und Artikel

Adjektive beschreiben Substantive näher. Sie passen sich in Kasus, Numerus und Genus an das Substantiv an: - der schöne Tag - die schöne Blume - das schöne Haus Artikel bestimmen das Substantiv und sind notwendig für die Grammatik: - der, die, das (bestimmte Artikel) - ein, eine (unbestimmte Artikel)

Wortstellung und Satzbau im Deutschen

5. Sentence Structure: Complexity, Embedding, and Information Flow

German supports deep syntactic embedding, allowing complex propositions with relative clauses, subordinate clauses, and parentheticals. The V2 rule applies even in embedded clauses, but subordinate clauses often relax word order for clarity. Example:

(Though the teacher was tired, he clearly explained the rules)

Relative clauses: *Der Professor, der gestern kam, hält einen

Parentheticals and discourse markers (*jedenfalls*, *andererseits*,
