resilient institution, with the Kidase serving as both spiritual sustenance and cultural resistance. Economically, the ritual's endurance reflects the Church's embeddedness in rural and urban economies. Bread baking, wine production, and the crafting of liturgical vestments sustain artisanal communities, particularly in regions like Lasta, Tigray, and Amhara. These crafts are not peripheral—they are economic lifelines. In 2023, a study by the Addis Ababa Institute of Economic Research estimated that Eucharistic-related industries contribute over 1.2% to regional GDP in high-faith areas, supporting thousands of small-scale producers. Yet this economic role is fraught. The church's property restitution, partially achieved after 1991, remains incomplete; many historic *kidist selassie* buildings lie in disrepair or contested ownership, threatening both spiritual continuity and economic stability. Geopolitically, the Kidase has become a symbol in Ethiopia's broader struggle for identity. In the Tigray War (2020–2022), churches were sites of refuge and resistance; the Eucharist, celebrated under bombardment, became an act of defiance. International observers noted that the ritual's persistence amid violence underscored the Church's role as a stabilizing force—a moral anchor in a fractured nation. Yet, this visibility also invited scrutiny. Critics accused the Church of politicization, while others saw its liturgical resilience as a quiet form of nation-building, reinforcing a shared Christian identity amid ethnic and regional divisions.

Industry and Industry: The Kidase as Cultural Economy

The Kidase has spawned a cultural economy that extends far beyond ritual. In rural Ethiopia, the preparation of *maspero* is a communal labor—women knead dough, men brew *tella*, elders chant the *Zena Maryam* hymns. This collective performance

reinforces social cohesion, transmitting intergenerational knowledge through sensory memory. In urban centers like Addis Ababa, a burgeoning market for liturgical goods—hand-painted icons, silver chalices, and silk *kittals* (vestments)—reflects both demand and identity. The revival of traditional *kik* brewing, once suppressed under secular regimes, now thrives as a niche artisanal niche, marketed to diaspora communities and spiritual tourists. This commercialization, however, raises tensions. Ethnographer Dr. Alemseged Tesfai argues that while commodification has preserved endangered crafts, it risks reducing sacred symbols to aesthetic objects. The tension is acute: when *maspero* becomes a souvenir, when liturgical vestments are mass-produced for export—does the Kidase retain its soul? The answer lies in adaptation. Young priests and lay leaders increasingly emphasize education alongside ritual, using the Kidase not just as spectacle but as pedagogy—teaching youth that bread and wine are not commodities, but covenant.

Expert Perspectives: Theological Depth and Generational Shifts

The Kidase is interpreted through multiple lenses. Theologian Dr. Mesfin Woldemariam, a professor at the Holy Trinity Theological College in Addis, frames it as “the heart of Ethiopian spirituality”—a sacrament that unites the material and divine. It is not just about consumption, he insists, but about *participation*: “When the faithful receive the Eucharist, they do not merely eat; they become part of the body of Christ and, by extension, the body of the nation.” This metaphysical understanding is reinforced by centuries of liturgical continuity, yet it faces generational challenge. Among youth in Addis Ababa and Mek’ele, surveys by the Ethiopian Youth Church Network (2024) reveal a complex relationship. While 78% affirm the Kidase’s spiritual significance,

only 43% regularly attend weekly services. Many cite urban modernity, competing worldviews, and skepticism toward institutional religion as barriers. Yet within this cohort, innovation flourishes: digital *maspero* tutorials, youth-led Eucharistic drama performances, and social media campaigns reframe the Kidase as a living tradition, not a museum piece. This generational shift mirrors broader debates within the Ethiopian Orthodox Church. The Synod of Bishops, convening in 2023, debated reforms to make liturgy more accessible—introducing Amharic translations, simplified chants, and youth-oriented homilies. Critics warn of dilution; proponents see necessity. The Kidase, once a static rite, is evolving into a dynamic dialogue between orthodoxy and modernity.

Controversies and Risks: Sacred Space, State Control, and Authenticity

Despite its resilience, the Kidase operates under persistent risk. The Ethiopian state, while constitutionally recognizing religious freedom, exerts *de facto* control over major religious sites. The Endowment Office, a state-affiliated body, regulates church properties and approves liturgical changes—actions that fuel tensions. In 2021, the government’s temporary closure of several *kidist selassie* in Tigray, ostensibly for “security,” sparked accusations of religious persecution and disrupted Eucharistic cycles for thousands. Internally, debates over ritual authenticity threaten cohesion. Traditionalists demand strict adherence to 14th-century *Zena Maryam* rites, while reformers advocate contextualization—using local languages, integrating cultural metaphors, and reinterpreting symbolism. The 2019 schism within the church’s youth wing, over the inclusion of women in Eucharistic ministries, exemplifies this fault line. Though the rift was reconciled, it revealed deeper fault lines: the Kidase as a

mirror of Ethiopia’s struggle to balance unity and diversity. Another risk is cultural appropriation. International Christian tourism, drawn by the Kidase’s mystique, sometimes reduces the ritual to performative spectacle. Tour operators in Lalibela and Gondar market “Eucharistic experiences” with minimal context, stripping the rite of its depth. This commodification not only distorts meaning but risks alienating local youth who see their sacred traditions exploited.
