This dynamic is not limited to tech firms; even traditional industries now face existential pressure to adapt or become obsolete.

The Industry Impact: From Onboarding to Operational Dominance

The first 90 days have evolved into a litmus test for leadership readiness across sectors, each with distinct success metrics. In healthcare, for example, a new hospital CEO must rapidly align clinical teams, integrate electronic health records, and address patient safety concerns—often with limited precedent due to pandemic-era disruptions. In finance, the focus is on restoring trust through transparent governance and navigating evolving regulatory landscapes, such as MiCA in the EU or SEC climate disclosure rules. In technology, the imperative is innovation velocity—launching minimum viable products, securing talent, and defending market share against agile competitors. Yet, regardless of sector, the core function remains consistent: establishing credibility, diagnosing systemic inefficiencies, and setting a trajectory. A 2022 McKinsey Global Institute study found that 68% of leadership transitions fail within the first 18 months, with 42% attributed to poor initial performance in the first 90 days. The root causes?
