The CCCS theorists—Hall, Paul Willis, Dick Hebdige—rejected the autonomy of high art, instead treating comics, music, fashion, and subcultures as texts loaded with social meaning. Their work was inherently geopolitical: born from Britain's post-imperial reckoning, it challenged the dominance of Western canons and exposed how race, class, and gender were coded into cultural forms. Comparative literature, by contrast, traces its lineage to 19th-century philology and 20th-century transnationalism. Early figures like Johann Wolfgang von Goethe and later Antoine Tomé pioneered cross-linguistic literary exchange, but it was the 1950s and 60s that saw its conceptual maturation. The collapse of European empires—India's independence (1947), decolonization across Africa—created an imperative: to read world literature not as anomalies, but as interconnected narratives shaped by migration, resistance, and hybridity. Scholars like Italo Calvino and later Franco Moretti pushed the field beyond national anthologies, advocating for “distant reading” to map literary

systems rather than isolated masterpieces. Moretti's **The Knights of the ABC** (1987) redefined how we see literary history—portraying it as a network of cultural flows rather than a linear progression. This shift mirrored broader economic changes: the rise of transnational publishing, global media, and the commodity status of culture itself. The geopolitical context of both fields is inseparable from their intellectual evolution. During the Cold War, cultural studies became a battleground. In the U.S., the CIA-funded Congress for Cultural Freedom promoted “counter-ideological” scholarship to counter Soviet narratives, embedding cultural analysis within geopolitical strategy. Meanwhile, in the Global South, comparative literature became a tool of epistemic resistance. Thinkers like Edward Said—whose **Orientalism** (1978) emerged from this milieu—exposed how Western scholarship had constructed the “Orient” as a passive, exotic Other to justify imperial dominance. Said's critique, rooted in comparative literary analysis, reframed cultural texts as instruments of power, not neutral expression. His work catalyzed a global turn toward decolonizing curricula, pushing universities to reconfigure what counted as “literature” and whose voices were centered. The economic transformation of the cultural

industries profoundly reshaped both disciplines. The 1980s neoliberal turn—deregulation, privatization, the digital revolution—redefined culture as capital. Publishing conglomerates like Penguin Random House and media giants such as Disney and Netflix consolidated control over narrative production, privileging market logic over aesthetic or critical depth. In this environment, cultural studies adapted: scholars like Nick Dyer-Witheford and Henry Jenkins examined how digital platforms restructured engagement, turning passive audiences into participatory cultures. Jenkins’ concept of “convergence culture” (2006) captured how media franchises now span film, gaming, and social media, demanding interdisciplinary tools to analyze their ideological and affective impacts.
