The Duma's limited powers, combined with the Tsar's ability to

dissolve it at will, revealed the autocracy's unresolved nature. The bourgeoisie, fearful of socialist radicalism, refused to fully support the Duma, aligning instead with the monarchy. Meanwhile, the peasantry, though mobilized in rural strikes, failed to coordinate with urban forces. The 1905 defeat was not a collapse but a pause—a rehearsal for 1917. The Duma's creation

institutionalized political contestation, yet the autocracy's survival ensured that fundamental transformation remained postponed. World War I accelerated the empire's disintegration. The Russian military, technologically obsolete and logistically bankrupt, suffered catastrophic defeats: the Brusilov Offensive (1916), the Brusilov Mutinies, and the 1916 Brusilov withdrawal. Mobilization strained an already exhausted economy: food shortages, inflation, and rail bottlenecks turned cities into battlegrounds of hunger. The Tsar's decision to take personal command in

1915 alienated the imperial court, leaving Alexandra and Rasputin to wield de facto power—fueling conspiracy and distrust. By early 1917, the capital was a powder keg. Pipes documented how war-induced economic collapse created a crisis of legitimacy: soldiers deserted en masse, factories ground to a halt, and the urban proletariat, already radicalized, faced starvation. The February Revolution of 1917—sparked by bread riots in Petrograd—was not a socialist coup but a popular uprising against autocracy. The Duma formed a Provisional Government dominated

by liberals and moderate socialists, while the Petrograd Soviet emerged as a counterpower of workers and soldiers. This dual authority—“dual power”—epitomized the revolution’s contested character. Pipes argued it was not a bourgeois-democratic revolution, as Marxist orthodoxy claimed, but a bourgeois revolution led by the proletariat, yet obstructed by elite resistance and war chaos. Their April Theses—calling for “peace, land, and bread”—resonated

with war-weary soldiers, land-hungry peasants, and strike-hungry workers. Yet the revolution's consolidation was far from assured. The Provisional Government's attempt to continue the war (until the

Treaty of Brest-Litovsk in March 1918) alienated nationalists and moderate socialists. The Bolsheviks' decree on land—seizing noble estates—and their nationalization of industry signaled a radical break. Pipes noted that the revolution's early phase reflected a popular, if vaguely defined, demand for radical change, but its direction was decisively shaped by Bolshevik ideology and ruthless centralization. The ensuing Civil War (1918-1922) was not merely a military conflict but a total social war. The Red Army, under Trotsky's leadership, fought to preserve the Soviet state against a

coalition of White armies (monarchists, liberals, foreign interventionists), anti-Bolshevik socialist factions, and foreign powers (Britain, France, Japan, the U.S.) fearing revolutionary export. The Red Terror, justified as defense against counterrevolution, targeted not only armed enemies but suspected bourgeois sympathizers,

clergy, and even dissenting communists. Industrial cities like Kazan and Samara saw mass repression; peasants rebelling against grain seizures were crushed. The war's toll—estimated 7-12 million deaths, including combat and famine—devastated the economy, reducing GDP by 50% and decimating the population. Yet the Bolsheviks prevailed, consolidating power through the Cheka, centralizing industry via War Communism, and defeating foreign intervention by 1920. The revolution's long-term implications extend far beyond Russia. Pipes argued that the

Bolshevik victory transformed global geopolitics: it birthed the first modern communist state, challenging liberal capitalism and reshaping 20th-century ideologies. The USSR's rise altered the balance of power, fueling ideological polarization culminating in the Cold War. Economically, War Communism's forced collectivization and state control presaged Stalin's Five-Year Plans, which industrialized Russia at immense human cost. The revolution's legacy also reshaped social structures: the abolition of feudal titles, legal equality (in theory), and state-led education and healthcare expanded social rights,
