The Indian government's 2023 proposal to regulate yoga teacher training under the National Council for Yoga Teachers marks a critical turning point, signaling growing pressure to standardize quality across a sector now worth billions.

In India, figures like Swami Chinmayananda and organizations such as the Parmarth Niketan have advocated for training programs that integrate Ayurveda, classical Sanskrit, and regional yogic lineages, challenging the dominance of Western-centric models. In countries

with strong yoga traditions—such as Nepal, Sri Lanka, and Bhutan—local institutions have developed parallel certification systems emphasizing cultural authenticity. The Yoga Research Foundation in Rishikesh, for instance, combines IYTS-aligned curricula with deep study of Patanjali’s Yoga Sutras and regional healing traditions. These initiatives reflect a broader demand for decolonized education: training that respects yoga’s Indian roots while adapting to global contexts. Yet market forces often override cultural sensitivity. In the U.S. and Europe, yoga studios frequently brand themselves as “authentic” or “traditional” despite relying on heavily Westernized, 300-hour-trained teachers with minimal engagement with Indian philosophy. This dissonance fuels tensions: while many practitioners seek yoga’s holistic benefits, others view the commercialized, decontextualized version as hollow—a commodified performance of wellness rather than a path to self-transformation.
