This shift mirrors the broader economic transformation: from industrial to informational, from physical to digital capital. Yet, with this intellectual expansion comes persistent critique. Scholars and former students argue that HBS remains an incubator of elite managerialism—producing leaders who excel in scaling, optimizing, and capitalizing, but often ill-equipped to challenge the systemic inequities that underpin capitalist dysfunction. The school's curriculum, while increasingly diverse and inclusive, continues to reflect a dominant cultural narrative: that efficiency, scalability, and shareholder value are the highest goods. The “disruption” ethos, celebrated in case studies, can inadvertently valorize short-termism, speculative risk-taking, and the erosion of institutional stability. This paradox is not lost on students. Many describe the HBS experience as a form of ideological apprenticeship—immersed in critical thinking tools, yet expected to apply them within a system that often rewards the very behaviors they are taught to question. The school's culture—intense, competitive, achievement-oriented—can paradoxically reinforce the very hierarchies and performance metrics it ostensibly seeks to transcend. The pressure to conform to a certain leadership archetype—decisive, confident, results-driven—may marginalize alternative visions of leadership rooted in collaboration, empathy, or long-term

stewardship. Geopolitical context further complicates the learning environment. As global power shifts from West to East, HBS students engage with case studies from emerging markets—India’s digital boom, Africa’s fintech revolution, Southeast Asia’s manufacturing ascent. Yet the curriculum’s core remains anchored in Western capitalist paradigms, often filtered through a U.S.-centric lens. This raises questions about epistemic diversity: whose knowledge counts? Whose histories of capitalism
