Critics argue that its one-size-fits-all structure fails to account for regional cost-of-living disparities, cultural spending norms, or the psychological toll of extreme austerity. In high-inflation economies like Argentina or Nigeria, where basic goods fluctuate dramatically monthly, strict category allocations can force households into unsustainable choices—prioritizing food over utilities, or rent over healthcare. Moreover, the psychological burden of constant financial surveillance has been documented in behavioral studies: the “budget fatigue” phenomenon, where compliance erodes over time, especially among low-income families with high opportunity costs.
