The doctrine of the "White Man's Burden" justified intervention as civilizational mission, masking profit motives behind paternalistic rhetoric. Historians like Partha Chatterjee have emphasized how colonial governance institutionalized a hierarchy where Indians were subjects, not citizens—denied political

representation while administrators operated as sovereigns. This epistemic dominance reshaped Indian self-perception, embedding colonial values into education, law, and bureaucracy. The Raj's infrastructure projects—railways, telegraphs—were not altruistic but designed to extract raw materials and consolidate control, linking Indian economies into a global imperial circuit.

Economic Imperialism: The Drain of Wealth and Structural Dependency (1858-1947)

The economic architecture of British imperialism in India was engineered for extraction. The 1874 Royal Commission on Indian Finance revealed that annual revenues transferred to Britain exceeded £100 million—equivalent to billions today—draining wealth that could have fueled industrialization. This "drain of wealth," as Dadabhai Naoroji famously documented in *Free India* (1903), starved Indian industries of capital, destroying traditional textile and handicraft sectors. Handlooms, once the backbone of India's economy, collapsed under competition from British machine-made cloth, leading to deindustrialization and massive rural unemployment. The colonial state reoriented agriculture toward cash crops—indigo, opium, cotton—for export, disrupting subsistence farming and exacerbating famines. The 1876-78 and 1899-1900 famines, exacerbated by export quotas and market manipulation, claimed millions of lives, not from scarcity alone but from policy. Economist Amartya Sen later argued that these famines were not natural disasters but

political failures rooted in colonial priorities—prioritizing revenue and trade over human welfare. Land revenue systems, such as the Permanent Settlement (1793) in Bengal, entrenched zamindari landlordism, converting tribal and peasant communities into tenant laborers. This created a class of intermediaries loyal to colonial rule while impoverishing cultivators. The introduction of private property laws undermined communal land tenure systems, fracturing social cohesion. As historian R. S. Sharma notes, "Colonial land policy was not just economic—it was a social engineering project designed to fragment resistance and create a compliant rural order." The colonial economy was not isolated; it was integrated into a global imperial network. India served as a market for British manufactured goods and a source of raw materials feeding British factories. This embedded India in a center-periphery hierarchy that persists in contemporary global trade structures, where former colonies remain resource-rich but value-poor.

British colonialism invested in infrastructure—railways, ports, telegraphs—not to develop India, but to serve imperial logistics.
