These early systems were proprietary, disseminated through internal memos and training, but their absence of global standardization led to frequent miscommunications—especially in joint ventures across colonial territories and nascent multinational consortia. Post-World War II, the geopolitical shift toward nationalization of resources and the birth of international institutions catalyzed formal standardization. The International Organization for Standardization (ISO) was founded in 1947 with a mission: to eliminate ambiguity in technical documentation. ISO 15014, first published in 1978, became foundational for piping codes, introducing standardized symbols for valves, flanges, and connections. Yet even this milestone reflected a compromise—balancing Western engineering traditions with Soviet and Japanese industrial practices. The Soviet Union, for instance, maintained its own system of color-coded, hand-drawn schematics with unique abbreviation schemes, often incompatible with ISO standards, reinforcing technological silos during the Cold War.
