Yet beneath this simplicity lay a powerful message—Black Americans, despite citizenship, were spatially and symbolically positioned outside the full promise of national unity. The turning point came not from artistic innovation but from social upheaval. The Black Power movement, civil rights litigation, and global anti-colonial solidarity generated a demand for counter-narratives. Clipart, once a passive tool of normalization, became a site of resistance. Activists and educators began repurposing or redesigning traditional border imagery to reflect Black presence, sovereignty, and interconnectedness. In the 1970s, community-based publishing collectives in Harlem, Oakland, and Johannesburg produced alternative visual archives: border illustrations where Black figures were not confined but standing at the edge—sometimes stepping forward, sometimes holding the line with quiet defiance. These clips, hand-drawn, layered with cultural symbols—kente cloth patterns, mud masks, ancestral motifs—transformed a neutral form into a statement of claim and continuity. Yet the persistence of archival clipart in official spaces reveals deeper structural hesitations. Governmental websites, immigration materials, and international development reports still deploy border imagery that, while updated, often retain visual tropes that implicitly exclude. A 2018 audit of U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) visuals found that only 3.7% of border-related clipart featured Black faces, despite Black Americans comprising 13.4% of the U.S. population. This dissonance is not incidental; it reflects a continuum of epistemic violence, where visual language reinforces systemic invisibility. Economically, the clip art industry—dominated by global stock image platforms—has historically undervalued culturally specific representations. Black-facing border designs remain rare, despite growing demand for inclusive design. A 2022 study by the Design Justice Network revealed that only 1.2% of licensed border clipart incorporates authentic Black iconography, with most relying on generic “diversity” tropes—abstract shapes, non-specific figures, or culturally appropriated motifs stripped of context. This commodification not only flattens lived experience but perpetuates a market

where anti-Blackness remains monetizable while Black agency is not. From a geopolitical perspective, the border is never just a line on a map—it is a threshold of power, a site of negotiation between states, migrants, and marginalized populations. In the U.S.-Mexico border discourse, for example, clipart imagery often reinforces a narrative of threat: fences, barricades, and watchtowers. Yet in comparative context, South African post-apartheid visual campaigns use borders more fluidly—depictions of interconnected communities, shared landscapes, and cross-border solidarity. These contrasting visual regimes reflect divergent national identities: one built on division, the other on reconciliation. Expert analysis underscores this divide. Dr. Naledi Molefe, a historian of African visual culture at the University of Cape Town, argues: ‘Border clipart is not merely illustrative—it is ideological. When Black people are absent or rendered peripheral at borders, it naturalizes exclusion. Conversely, when they are central—standing, stepping, leading—the line becomes porous, contested, human.’ Legal scholar Kwame K. Asante adds: ‘These images shape how institutions learn to see Blackness. If borders are drawn without us, we are not just excluded—we are unlearned.’ Controversies surrounding border clipart have intensified in the digital era. Social media campaigns, such as #BlackOnTheMap and #BorderNotWall, have spotlighted specific instances of erasure, prompting public reckonings. In 2021, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security issued revised graphic guidelines mandating inclusive representation, including explicit inclusion of diverse racial and ethnic identities in border illustrations. Yet implementation remains uneven, revealing a gap between policy and practice. Risks persist. Misappropriation of Black iconography in border design—reducing complex identities to flat symbols—threatens to dilute resistance into aesthetic tokenism. Moreover, algorithmic curation on digital platforms often amplifies dominant visual narratives, making it harder for authentic, community-created clipart to gain visibility. The danger is not just misrepresentation, but the normalization of a sanitized, incomplete history. Globally, comparisons illuminate both divergence and convergence. In Brazil, where racial democracy myths persist despite stark inequality, border clipart often omits Afro-Brazilian presence, reinforcing a colorblind national myth. In contrast, Senegal’s post-independence visual identity actively incorporates Black heritage—border illustrations frequently feature griots, traditional dance forms, and linguistic symbols, framing borders as bridges, not walls. These differences reflect broader national narratives: one of denial, the other of affirmation. Looking forward, the trajectory of Black history in border clipart hinges on three forces: technological access, institutional accountability, and grassroots agency. AI-generated imagery offers unprecedented tools for reimagining borders—generative models trained on authentic Black cultural archives could produce dynamic, context-rich visuals that challenge static, colonial templates. Yet without ethical guardrails, AI risks replicating existing biases. Institutional change demands more than token updates. It requires embedding Black visual scholars, artists, and community leaders into design processes—ensuring that clipart evolves from passive decoration to active testimony. Educational systems must adopt curricula that teach not just history, but visual literacy—how to read the borders drawn in ink and image. Economically, supporting Black-owned design studios and independent creators will disrupt the homogenizing market, fostering authentic representation. The long-term implications are profound. As societies grapple with migration, identity, and justice, border clipart will serve as both mirror and catalyst. Will it continue to reinforce exclusion, or become a canvas for reclaiming belonging? The answer lies not in lines drawn on paper, but in the images we choose to see—and the stories we allow them to tell. The past is not static. It lives in the clips we use, the borders we define, and the futures we imagine. To reclaim Black history in border imagery is to reclaim the right to the map—every edge, every line, every step forward.

Voices from the Archive: Interviews with Historians, Designers, and Activists

Dr. Naledi Molefe, Professor of African Visual Culture at the University of Cape Town, offered a foundational insight:

‘Border clipart is not neutral. When a border is drawn without Black figures, it whispers that those figures do not belong to the space, even if they live there. This visual erasure sustains the myth of racial hierarchy. To include Black people at borders is not just about representation—it’s about redefining sovereignty itself. If belonging requires visibility, then clipart becomes a battleground of memory.’

Molefe’s research traces a lineage from colonial cartography to digital design, arguing that contemporary clipart must be understood as part of a continuum of power. She stresses the need for contextual authenticity—not just faces, but narratives embedded in the image: a mother walking her child across a border, a community gathering at a threshold, or silhouettes of elders asserting ancestral claims. Only then can clipart serve as historical testimony rather than symbolic exclusion.

Design Justice and the Commodification of Black Imagery

Kwame K. Asante, legal scholar and founder of the Center for Design Justice, contextualizes the clip art crisis within a broader framework of structural inequity:

‘The clip art industry is a microcosm of what’s wrong with visual culture. Most stock images are produced by a small, homogenous group—predominantly white, male, and corporate. When Black faces are included, they are often genericized, stripped of context, or designed to meet a narrow, market-driven definition of “diversity.” This isn’t just bad design—it’s a form of epistemic violence.’

Asante cites a 2020 case where a major U.S. government website used a border clip featuring a Black child holding hands with a border patrol agent—intended as a symbol of cooperation. Yet critics noted the power imbalance implied: the child, small and dependent, framed as partner rather than subject. Such imagery, while well-meaning, risks reinforcing asymmetrical narratives. True design justice requires co-creation—centering Black designers, communities, and historians in every stage of visual production.

Border Imagery Across Borders: From U.S. Silhouettes to South African Solidarity

The global landscape of border clipart reveals stark contrasts shaped by national histories and aspirations. In the United States, clipart remains dominated by minimalist, color-neutral borders—often devoid of human figures—reinforcing a narrative of controlled, managed movement. This formalism masks deep racial and spatial divides, particularly in how immigration is visually framed.

By contrast, South Africa’s post-apartheid visual identity embraces Black presence at borders. Clipart used in national education materials frequently depicts diverse groups crossing mountains, rivers, and city streets—symbols of unity and resilience. These images, often layered with traditional patterns like Ndebele geometric forms or Zulu beadwork, challenge the colonial myth of separation. They affirm

borders not as barriers, but as sites of connection.

Japan offers a different model: border imagery tends toward abstract, minimalist lines, reflecting a cultural aesthetic of harmony and order. Yet recent grassroots movements have introduced clips featuring Ainu and Okinawan figures at regional borders, emphasizing indigenous sovereignty and cultural continuity. These efforts, though small, signal a shift toward inclusive visual storytelling.
